Livin' It Up On Night Out

The Charlton Playgroup's annual "Girl's Night Out" (GNO) - held at the Rex on Friday 13 March - provided a chance of escaping the gloomy coronavirus news for a couple of hours.

A major fundraiser for the group, the "Girl's Night Out" - now in its fifth year has seen more than \$10,000 raised over the years and has offered a night of relaxation for those who attend.

A variety of stallholders, along with Charlton businesses "House To Home" and "Charlton Florist and Fashion" (which remained open for the night) gave the crowd an opportunity to browse and inquire about items from the eco-friendly to the artisan crafts.

GNO co-ordinator, Bree McPhee, said it

was exciting to see new stall holders come on board, especially new businesses in Charlton, a number of which operate from an online presence. These included The Rural Eco Store and Kindred Kreations. Other businesses represented came from Donald and Bendigo.

Interest in sustainable products, and the resurgence of macramé to create attractive and useable everyday items were amongst the eye-catchers, along with the everreliable Tupperware and beauty products.

"We really appreciate the support of all our stall holders" said Bree, "as they also generously donate items for our raffle which helps to boost our funds. We would also like to acknowledge Heenan's Charlton Authorized Newsagency for undertaking the selling of tickets for our event."

President of the Charlton Play Group, Abby Mulquiny, said that support from near and far for the event was important, and she thanked stall holders and attendees for their commitment, especially this year with the uncertainty created by the Covid-19 escalation.

GNO was named the Charlton Event of the Year on Australia Day this year, and while the event brings the efforts of the Play Group's carers together, the strong outcomes of financial strengthening and community enjoyment have made it a welcome occasion on the social calendar.

The evening was rounded off with screening of the movie "Bombshell".

Golden Grains Museum News


Greetings everyone from all of us here at the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. Well, there is not much that hasn't been said already about the crisis facing Australia and the world at present. In line with all the safe distancing practices and Government regulations, the museum will be closed to the public until further notice. Volunteers will be continuing the work on sorting and cataloguing our collection, and family research will still be available if required; once again following health safety guidelines. Our Bingo trip to Donald in May is unlikely to go ahead on the current advice.

Prior to the past couple of weeks we were continuing to make headway compiling an accurate catalogue of our items in the showcases and storage. This involves checking lists of what is on display with our records and updating if necessary. New items have been gratefully received and placed on show as appropriate, with work behind the scenes going on. As always, the museum is happy to receive historic items with significance to Charlton, a local business or individual from the district. Please consider the history of an old photo or item before throwing it away. If you know the background behind the item, even better.

How did you go with last month's mystery item? It was a fantastic item donated by Malcolm Hudgson from Noske Bros. They were grain scales from the 1920s used for weighing grain in bushels, and later used by Malcolm at the Charlton Grain Shed. For something a bit different this month we don't have a mystery item, but a mystery location. Somewhere around Charlton is this plaque for the planting of an oak tree in 1919 to commemorate the end of World War One. Do you know where? Good luck.

When things get back to some normality please consider joining us as a volunteer here at the museum. Another option to support the work is to become a Friend of the Museum. Anzac Day 2020

ANZAC DAY 2020.

Anzac Day, the One Day of the Year, will be quite different this year to what we are used to

participating in. There will be no wreath laying at the Cenotaph, no band, no march and no remembrance ceremony in the Shire Hall.

But Anzac Day WILL be commemorated in some form or another, even if with only one participant. Whether there will be a service, wreath laying, the Last Post played, a minute's silence observed for fallen and departed comrades and our flags - including our recently acquired New Zealand flag - flown, will depend on the public announcements by the government and by RSL closer to the

day. Whatever is decided, public health and safety must be our priority and for this reason the public will be asked not to attend.

Anzac Day badge sales have been booked for Monday 20 to Friday 24 April, but it is most likely that this will not take place due to Covid 19 concerns.

Whilst the public are asked to stay at home on Anzac Day, the RSL is asking that instead you tune in by radio or television to services, that you reflect on the service and sacrifice of our veterans and those who are still serving and that you remember our pledge as a nation; Lest We Forget.

Charlton Croquet Club

Coming Event: Saturday 3rd October 2020 – The Charlton Croquet Club will be celebrating 140 years since Croquet was first played in Charlton.

Croquet in Charlton has been played at five venues: In 1880 the lady promoters of the Croquet Club requested the attendance of members at practice on the afternoons of Mondays and Thursdays, on the ground adjoining the State School (Learmonth St). In 1906 the Croquet Club amalgamated with the Tennis Club and they played on the block adjoining the tennis court in Halliday Street. In 1910 croquet was played at the back of the Mechanics Institute on gravel scrapes. About 1920 croquet moved to the side of the Mechanics and shortly after planted grass to play on. In 1953 the Croquet Club moved to its current site at Gordon Park where four B Grade lawns were set up and these could be converted to two A Grade lawns.

The third match was between the top two teams, the Wimmera Mallee Belles and Wimmera Roos. This game was played on the hard wicket at Horsham College. Spectators were not disappointed with what they saw, as the standard of play was high. Belles won the toss and elected to bowl, and were on the ball in the field taking a total of 10 (a team high) wickets. Lucinda took 3 wickets for 13 runs off 4 overs and Maddi 1 wicket for 11 runs off 3 overs. Maddi opened the batting and found the gaps well making 34 runs (off 20 balls) including 5 boundaries. 

MAJOR CHANGES TO CHARLTON HARNESS RACING

To update all of our members and those that follow harness racing, there have been some major developments that affect the Charlton Harness Racing Club from April 2nd.

Harness Racing Victoria have released a new racing calendar that is designed to even further limit the travel for participants, in line with public health recommendations in order to slow the spread of the coronavirus.

Racing will now be conducted within 6 defined districts, restricted to the participants from those areas.

This means that Charlton trainers will only be able to race at Bendigo, being our designated track for the Central region. All foreseeable Charlton meetings will be transferred to Bendigo.

Drivers will only be allowed to drive in the zone closest to where they live.

All stringent checks and movement protocols will be strictly enforced within this new model.

As Rob Auber, General Manager of the Victorian Harness Racing Club stated, "HRV has had to make some tough decisions to maintain the continuity of racing. Moving to a regional based model gives this sport the best chance to succeed."

We hope he is right.






