

"Corona Pirates" is the term coined by the children's two-year old sister, Audrey, to explain why they couldn't use the skate park on their many walks during the recent lockdown period. With the area cordoned off, Audrey's imaginative reasoning was that the "Corona Pirates" had taken over!

The return to face-to-face class-room learning was highly anticipated by Oliver and Lilymae, even though the pair had experienced a couple of days in class since home-schooling began in late Term 1. However, it's nothing like having all your close friends back together again!

As a Grade 3 student Oliver's permanent return won't happen until June 9, but there was no doubting the pair's excitement about resuming a near normal schedule.

Their mother, Bree, said the children have been managing pretty well at home, but have kept asking, "Are we going back tomorrow?'

Juggling the older children's needs, along with entertaining a two-year old and keeping the house quiet for her husband Wes, who works nights hadn't been easy. Bree is also attempting online studies.

Having nothing but praise for the work

of the Charlton College staff, Bree said that home-schooling had been kept to a regular schedule of 9am – 3pm, with a break from 11-12 midday.

While Oliver had online work and 10am zoom hook-ups with the school, Lilymae had received packs of worksheets which were completed, photographed, uploaded and then assessed by her teacher with feedback returned.

Keeping young minds focused had sometimes been a challenge, but Bree said using the afternoons for outside activities and lots of walks had been important. That and creating a dance video for PE class and searching for butterflies and ladybirds

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# Beyond the Battle Lines

As the world fights against Covid 19, there's a battle of another kind taking place in Charlton.

While there's no blood, and minimal real -time damage, the battle is intense and, surprisingly, it's being fought indoors and with not a digital device in sight.

Welcome to the world of miniature wargames!

Unlike their real-life counterparts, these war games don't incur GDP- smashing costs, although for the hobbyists they can still be quite expensive.

For Charlton resident, Markus Phillips, his world of miniature battles has been a long-time passion. Triggered at high school with a small group of similarly impassioned enthusiasts, Markus's involvement is not mired in aggression, nor does it emanate from a warmongering attitude. It's a devotion which has evolved out of a love of history, an interest in creating the tiny replica terrains and enjoying the social pleasure of a shared interest with many others.

While some might see this as another version of "boys and their toys", the acquisition of historical knowledge is as much a part of the action as the strategy and maneuvers which make up the games.

Markus has amassed a large collection, comprising 1000s of figurines, game strategies, wartime memorabilia, books, pictures and DVDs which fill a large coshared space at home with his wife, Jo, who is an equally committed patchwork quilt maker. The pair have a very large space in which to pursue their activities, although Jo says she has her eye on expanding more of her quilt-making terrain!

The couple moved from Mornington to Charlton in 2017 and quickly became involved in the community. Jo is an active member of Cabbaritta CWA, while Markus has recently been appointed as cocoordinator of the Charlton Neighbourhood House, and is involved with the RSL and the Golden Grains Museum, while both help out at the Charlton Club.

The centre-point of Markus's domain is a large table, upon which was laid out a naval battle from World War II entitled "Cruel Seas". Focusing on the smaller naval craft of WW II the objective of the game is to safely bring the flotilla to dock across the expanse of occupied waters. The vessels are allocated cards with directions outlined and there is a complex set of scenarios which are facilitated by dice throwing to move the models around. (Rulers and tape measures are also involved). A ten-sided dice enables the activation of combat opportunities such as the firing of guns, torpedoes, grenades and the like.

Normally multiple players would take part around the table, however with the Covid 19 restrictions Markus and a friend from his former club in Mornington have continued to play remotely (a range of games), using Discord which is a platform better suited to gaming than Zoom.

While the general perception of this hobbyist activity might bring to mind certain genres of battle (ie. fantasy, historical,), if you can think of any conflict or combat zone, then the chances are there's probably a game about it. That makes for a lot of war games!

Markus has eclectic tastes. With the exception of fantasy, his favourite game is the D Day landings, which Jo says in game

form probably takes longer to reenact than the real thing. Interest in Ancients (Greek) to the Medieval, Dark Ages to the Renaissance, through to the Napoleonic, Georgian, and contemporary conflicts it's the attraction of gaining knowledge about the eras, the details and technical accuracy of the weaponry, uniforms, strategies, as well as developing the flexibility needed to respond to maneuver changes. endgames may not always match with the historical reality.

While the actual gameplaying can appear complicated to an outsider, one of the movement's most captivating elements is the minutiae of the scaled down models. As mesmerizing as the strategies, the tiny pieces

- whether structures, battalions, artillery or weaponry - are measured, heightwise, in millimeters and can be scaled down to ratios of 1:300 (smaller for some specialist pieces), with 1:48 being a popular size.

Markus's collection embraces multiple eras, with numerous trays of battalion figurines, vehicles, and other associated objects stored around the periphery of the room. A recent acquisition has been a 3D printer from which limitless objects can be formed at a fraction of the cost of purchasing and which also enables the option for even more diversity of models. Free downloads are easily transferred to the printer which then creates the desired object with an impressive degree of detail. Markus is also fortunate to have a friend who owns a laser printer who makes exquisitely detailed buildings to add authenticity to the various environments.

With miniature wargamer groups in Swan Hill, Bendigo and friends in Castlemaine and Inglewood who share this similar passion, Markus is hopeful that a proposed event called the "Mallee Melee" might still be able to take place in Charlton in July. Creating a fun weekend for enthusiasts, the event would also present locals with an opportunity to learn more about this fascinating pastime.

For the time being though, it's back to the battle-ground – whether sea, desert or swamp – and preparing for the next largescale conflict – all from the comfort and safety of home!



# Jimmy Onus Remembers Charlton

Jimmy Onus recently contacted Charlton Golden Grains Museum Secretary, Carolyn Olive, to reminisce about Charlton where he lived for a short time in the early 1960s.

Jimmy and his brother Michael, who are First Nations People, including being *Dja Dja wurrung* on their father's side, used to come and stay in Charlton for the holidays with Mr and Mrs Russell Lambert. They had no children of their own at the time, and would pick Jimmy and Michael up from a Boys' Home in Melbourne. The boys, who had two older sisters who lived elsewhere, eventually moved to Charlton to live with their grandparents, Nora King and Alan (Cobber) Karpeny. They initially lived near the river but eventually moved into a house in Mary Street, ironically next door to the Lamberts.

Despite being the only Aboriginal children living in Charlton at the time, Jimmy cannot recall this ever being an issue and has fond memories of his time here. He recalled climbing the railway water tower to fish for trout; rabbiting and looking for wood ducks with Ron White out the back of Bill Fitzpatrick's depot; visiting the swaggie, Paperbark Jack, at the showgrounds; getting joy rides with Micky Griffin in his sulky and going to the pictures at the Rex where he and Michael refused to stand for the National Anthem. Jimmy cannot recall any particular schoolteachers or school friends but can still picture the school buildings and yard very clearly.

Jimmy's mother and two aunts moved to Charlton and the boys relocated just out of town to an old house with no electricity. The school bus used to pick them up and drop them off to school and as their house was a little worse for wear, and a little embarrassing, they used to get dropped off at the much flasher house up the road. They often walked across the paddock to spend time at Ron Giles' farm. Jimmy's family eventually left Charlton when the boys were still quite young and they moved to Western Australia.

Jimmy left High School at the age of 14 after receiving a severe reprimand for innocently telling his teacher and the class that there were people in Australia before Captain Cook 'discovered it'. Jimmy then went to work for the railways, after lying about his age, and recalls hardly being able to lift a crowbar. Jimmy has had various jobs since then including working for the Victorian Railways and the State Archaeologist.

Jimmy is related to William 'Bill' Onus, a *Yorta Yorta* man, who was a high-profile Aboriginal activist and successful entrepreneur.

Bill campaigned to obtain civil liberties for Aboriginal people and mentored a new generation of leaders who were able to build upon his legacy in Aboriginal rights. Jimmy can recall Bill's Aboriginal souvenir shop in Belgrave. To advertise his wares to passing motorists, Bill would throw a boomerang across the road, catching it on its return. Coincidentally, Bill visited Charlton in 1961 as guest speaker for the Charlton Aboriginal Advancement League and also gave a boomerang throwing display to the H.E.S. students.

Jimmy is also the great, great grandson of King Billy, the chief of five clans of the *Gunditjamara* nation of southwestern Victoria, the position inherited from his father, Baum Baum, before him. This area incorporates the recent World Heritage listed eel aquiculture systems at Lake Condah, an area of extreme cultural significance and of special importance to Jimmy and his family.

Jimmy has seven children who have all embraced their Aboriginal heritage. His partner is archaeologist/anthropologist, Dr Heather Builth, who lives and works in Western Australia. His brother Michael remains in Western Australia and has worked for the Wildlife and Fisheries Department for most of his life.

He brought in truckloads of soil (donated by Will and Jac Lesley and Terry and Laura Fitzpatrick and families) to fill the hole left from the old kiosk and change room and levelled the area. Trenches were dug and Wes and Kye Jenkyn then laid a watering system and planted lawn seed. The Netball Club would like to acknowledge the Buloke Shire for covering the cost of the restoration work.

Recently, the first of a series of trees was planted. The club is seeking expressions of interest from those willing to donate money to cover the cost of the trees. # Golden Grains Museum News

Hello everyone from the Golden Grains Museum. It has been great to follow the easing of restrictions across many areas of our day to day lives, and it is expected not to be long before we can once again welcome visitors. As always, work has been going on behind closed doors on various projects, and the task of archiving and cataloguing never seems to end. We have continued to receive items of significance to Charlton and the shire, and always welcome donations of historic items with a local story. We are also always interested in family histories, either written or oral and digitised onto a DVD. If you know of someone who may be interested to sit down over a cuppa and video record their life story let us know. These will be stored away for future generations or family researchers to reference.

Following the popularity of last month's story of some of John Thomas Proctor's early recollections of Charlton, we thought to carry on again this month with another early resident to the district, Edward 'Ned' McGurk. At 80 years of age Ned lost his sight in one eye while chopping firewood, and the other was failing very quickly affecting his reading and writing. We are fortunate that Ned then detailed so much of his life to his daughter Eileen, with whom he lived, for her to record.

Ned was born at Cardigan near Ballarat on July 18, 1860 to Thomas and Bridget McGurk. In 1872, at the age of 12, Thomas and Ned arrived in Woosang by dray setting up home with many other settlers in the newly subdivided area taking up 320 acres. This followed the Land Act, 1869 which called on station owners to surrender their land held under title for free selection. Life was tough for the early settlers with crops being attacked by disease, caterpillars, grasshoppers, drought and summer storms. The lack of a veterinary service saw sheep and cattle inflicted with a wide range of issues, while drought was often commonplace.

Ned detailed to Eileen over ten histories of different subjects, and each are fantastic reading. He tells of The Halfway House Hotel and Post Office built on the main track between Wedderburn and Charlton where the mail run could stable and change horses, and tells of the other various mail runs to isolated towns in the district. Of constant worry to the settlers were Bushrangers including Morgan, Sullivan, Melville, Gypsy Jim and Dick Massey. Several murders were attributed to these outlaws.

Ned tells of the aborigines following the track from the Loddon River to the Avoca and their various camp sites. He mentions the various tribes, chiefs, hunting and their love of sport., particularly cricket, football and foot running. Ned mentions Bobby Kinnear who won the Stawell Gift, and others who had success at the Charlton Athletic Club. He records the aborigines would often entertain onlookers with displays of boomerang throwing and corroborees.

As well as the more popular industries of sheep and grain other businesses emerged in the area. Many settlers planted vineyards while others tried fruit growing and bred pigs and horses. Gold was discovered at one of the Edwards family properties by fencing contractors from Wedderburn in the 1930s followed by the discovery of Bells Reef, around 9 miles from Wedderburn.

Ned died at the age of 100 in 1960 and like so many of his generation, the district owes so much too. The hardships the early pioneers endured to scratch a living for their families is hard to contemplate today, but their legacy lives on. Until next month. 'Like' our Facebook Page for updates







# Beautify Charlton - June Update

By the time you are reading this the trees on the nature strips of Mildura Way should have been removed. Replanting we hope will be happening in a timely manner.

The key reasons we had for the removal of the desert ash trees were their unsuitability as a street tree, poor presentation through the level of dieback and dead trees among them and the contamination they cause in the river.

There are two other species on the western side of Mildura Way. One is a large Kurrajong at 22 Mildura Way which although a magnificent structure presents very poorly. The contractor's arborist will examine it at the time of tree removal. If suitable it will be lopped and trimmed to give it the best possible chance of regrowth and rejuvenation and it will be assessed again in 12 months or so. There must be reasons for the way it appears now and if the arborist feels it has no future, it will be removed either immediately or at a future time.

A flowering gum further along Mildura Way the Shire wished to remain. It will be trimmed and cleaned up by the arborist and we remain hopeful it will fit in to the surrounds.

Once Mildura Way has been replanted our major aims aside from summer watering, will be to engage the community on Stage 3 initiatives which include town signage and Charltons Notables. We can become more proactive on these once we are able to move more freely.

We have received numerous comments over the last 12 months for the project to remove all desert ash trees from the streets of the town. "Get rid of all of them!" has been a common refrain. To put *Beautify Charlton* together over the 3 stages to be honest there wasn't the time, capacity or money to achieve removal of all desert ash trees, but we are listening.

Basically, if the great majority of people are saying they wish the rest of the desert ashes to be removed, we will investigate a proposal to do that in collaboration with the Shire. Watering of the new plantings in the summer months for a couple of years would be the key issue. That would have to be managed somehow.

When planting is complete in Mildura Way we will be acknowledging once more those groups who have made this community enterprise financially possible and will then be offering personal income tax deductible donations to assist with the future initiatives. This was alluded to some time ago so as things slowly return to some form of normality we are revisiting it.

Facebook has not been updated for a while, there have been a few reasons for that but it will start to move again soon! More information to come through various sources throughout 2020.

# Community Sport Sector COVID-19 Short-term Survival Package

What is the Community Sport Sector COVID-19 Short -term Survival Package?

The community sport sector is integral to driving participation and competition in sport and active recreation in Victoria. Participation in community sport improves the physical and mental health of Victorians of all ages and enriches social and community cohesion. The sector has been heavily impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. This short-term survival program is designed to support the ongoing operational viability of the community sport and active recreation sector throughout the COVID-19 shutdown period and beyond, ensuring organisations are equipped to recommence the delivery of their activities to the community following the lifting of restrictions.

Stream 2 Category 2: Grassroots Operational Support funding for community sporting and active recreation organisations including associations, leagues and clubs, to maintain operational viability.

Leagues and associations can apply for up to \$15,000 Applications will be accepted from 25 May 2020 until program close on 15 June 2020, or until the funding allocation is exhausted. Applications on a completed application form will be accepted through the DJPR Online Grants portal <a href="https://businessvic.secure.force.com/GrantsPortalLogin">https://businessvic.secure.force.com/GrantsPortalLogin</a>. Detailed application guidelines are available at Sport and Recreation Victoria's website

In the Charlton area Stream 2 could be a possible source of funding to our local sporting and recreational clubs. Clubs - are not-for-profit incorporated associations delivering recreational, instructional and/or competitive physical activity opportunities to community participants. Stream 2 Category 2 will provide support to community organisations delivering sport and active recreation programs anywhere in Victoria to support operational viability. Grants up to \$1,000.

To be eligible for funding under Stream 2 – Category 2 organisations must meet the eligibility criteria which includes,

Be a community organisation delivering sport and active recreation programs anywhere in Victoria. Be non-government, not-for-profit and registered as an incorporated body at the time of application and for the duration of the funding.

### **Conditions of Applying**

Financial support will be provided to assist the organisation remain operational during the eligibility period, and to support readiness to return-to-play in adherence with Victorian Chief Health Officer restrictions and advice. Buloke Shire Council will employ up to 50 new staff for up to six months, as part of the State Government's Working for Victoria

initiative.

One of the planks of the initiative is matching, with local councils, people who have lost their jobs due to the economic impacts of the pandemic




