Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome everyone to this issue of our happenings at the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. As you will be aware, like so many groups around the town, our volunteers have been practising safe distancing and not attending the building in groups. Limited archiving and other duties have been going on behind closed doors, but we are looking forward to again opening our doors to the public. Remember, if there is family research you need, or local history details, feel free to contact one of the numbers below and we may be able to assist.

How did you go with our mystery location last month? The plaque itself may be a bit hidden in Elliott Gardens at the end of High Street, but the magnificent Oak that towers above it certainly isn't. The mystery item this month may be a bit difficult, but the hint is that it is used in the kitchen. Answer next month.

This issue I have listed a couple of paragraphs about the Charlton Post Office as recorded by town pioneer, John Thomas Procter, from his notes, '*Reminiscences of Early Charlton*'. After attending the Back to Charlton Agricultural Show in 1938, it appears John wanted to record his early life in Charlton , and we today have these first hand details about the town and district. Born around 1857 in Wedderburn, John moved with his family to Charlton in 1870. He was a successful business man and farmer, and his family remained in the district for many years. His writings cover many areas of interest including, Squatters, Aborigines, Free Selection, Farms, Charlton's growth and more. We have several excellently edited copies at the Museum if in the future you would like to view them. So hear is what John told us about the postal service.

"The Post Office was at first temporarily located at Armstrong's homestead, later removing to Peter Johnson's "Bridge Store". For many years the township carried the name of East Charlton, and speaking from memory only, l believe it was the postal department that shortened the name to Charlton. But for a considerable period after entering my store duties (in Feb. 1875) at Mr Johnson's Charlton Store, the official postal name was "Yowen Hill". Many a time l have assisted making up the mail bags with my employer's wife, who was the post-mistress at the store for several years. Alas and alak: all my mates of the day are gone, with perhaps one, or at the most two exceptions, and only l can tell the tale.

The old times are still sweet in my memory, and l can still imagine John Sayers sounding his bugle at 7:30pm along the St Arnaud Road. Half an hour later, we in the store were delivering hundreds of letters, and doing business at the same time. Then, when Mr Arundell- "Little Bob the mailman" - arriving by coach from Wedderburn, we got more mail (Melbourne letters mostly) and a further influx of letter seekers, as no carriers were sent out from the semi-government office. In those days there were no postal notes, and l can't remember if we ever issued P.O. Orders. In time however, the Postal Department opened a Government Office in Camp Street, and the first Post Master was Thomas Holderness, a brother-in-law of Mr Joseph Adamthwaite, farmer of Quambatook. Mr Holderness was a most capable and cautious postal officer, and l hope he is alive to read this tribute to his character. Probably by this time the Department had dropped the name "Yowen Hill" and substituted East Charlton, in the later days dropping the "East" and making the name Charlton only. The new premises mentioned (erected in 1876?) became the home of Mr Ike Dow who, with his family, is still in occupation."

Maybe in this time of isolation, you may consider doing exactly what John did, and write a record of your recollections. Maybe interview a family member or neighbour when it's possible and preserve those valuable memories. The museum can help with a list of questions for guidance and suggestions about various formats you may consider.

ANZAC DAY 2020.

But the day was commemorated, albeit very quietly. At the Cenotaph in High Street, the flag was flown at half mast, wreaths were laid by RSL and by Red Cross, a minute's silence was observed and the Ode was recited. At the Lone Pine, by the clubrooms in Armstrong Street, flags were flown at half mast, wreaths were laid by RSL members, a minute's silence was observed and the Ode was recited.

Many residents greeted the dawn in their driveways with light and reflection and some played recordings of the Last Post and Rouse

Honouring the Legacy of Veterans in Charlton

Just in time for ANZAC Day, Victorian communities are being given more opportunities to remember and honour veterans through various projects to build and repair memorials, preserve stories and ensure their wellbeing.

Minister for Veterans, Robin Scott, this week announced \$700,000 for 63 projects across the state as part of four grant programs: Victoria Remembers, Restoring Community War Memorials and Avenues of Honour, the ANZAC Day Proceeds Fund and the 75th Anniversary of the End of World War Two.

It includes \$10,000 for Charlton RSL Sub-Branch to commission a mural on the outside wall of the RSL building commemorating women from the Australia's Women's Land Army who served in rural Australia during WW2.

In addition, more support is being directed to organisations Carry On and Melbourne Legacy to provide on-going welfare support – including emergency food supplies and food vouchers – amid the unprecedented coronavirus pandemic.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said the Victorian Government has worked to ensure all funded

projects comply with coronavirus restrictions, such as physical distancing.

"This is fantastic news for our local community and Charlton RSL Sub-Branch, which has done such great work supporting its members and keeping our veterans' legacy in the forefront of peoples' minds," she said.

"It will help ensure they aren't forgotten and also teach future generations about how their sacrifice has led to the freedoms we enjoy today," Ms Pulford said.

Minister for Veterans, Robin Scott, said veterans fought hard for our shared values and for a diverse and inclusive Victoria and the projects will ensure their memories live on.

"We owe it to our veterans to honour their legacy and preserve their stories for future generations and that's even more important in these challenging times," Mr Scott said.

Beating the Bug - Learning at "Corona College"

Upheaval during the final week of Term 1 saw a sudden move to home-schooling due to coronavirus, so the setting up of a new routine so close to holidays was a big ask on children and families, especially with so many other changes currently impacting on our everyday lives.

For the Holmes-Brown family in Charlton, keeping the education wheels turning for the four younger members of the family took on a structured approach, and it has been one which the family has embraced with enthusiasm.

For Lucinda (15), Fletcher (13), and Anika (10) (and there's twoyear-old, Franklin), the experience was a positive one under the guidance of their parents, Matt and Jacinta, along with the solid preparation by Charlton College.

"The College was really organized with preparing the current homework," said Jacinta, "making for a very seamless transition, so the children haven't been too concerned about missing school".

Dubbing their new learning centre "Corona College", classes at the kitchen table starts at 9am each day, with Lucinda and Fletcher following their normal school timetable, and then everyone stopping for recess at the normal school recess time of 10:30am. Classes continued until around 1pm, then if the set work was completed extra activities were added to the afternoons.

These included cooking – one day it was the evening meal, another it was rabbit cupcakes from a recipe emailed by the Health and Home Eco teacher, Kim Thompson.

Additional activities have included a family discussion on "When I was your age" to help explain the impacts of major events on each generation, plus planting seeds for future food, and helping out with jobs around the house.

With an eye to the future, thirteen-year-old Fletcher has been keeping a diary to chronicle this extraordinary time and to record his responses to it. Commencing from before the school closure, one extract refers to the abrupt ending of the term, along with missing seeing friends. However, he believes that the "Corona College" experience has offered them all a very unique opportunity.

While recognizing that our rural communities offer many benefits especially at this time (ie. big backyards are a great asset for families) Jacinta said that this crisis had shown the children how technology – especially the internet – could be used for very positive outcomes, and not just as a recreational substitute.

With structured home-schooling continuing during Term 2, "Corona College" will continue to provide this family with a lasting memory of a most extraordinary time.

Tournaments have been an integral part of the Charlton Croquet Club for many years.

The first mention of a tournament is in 1909. The trophy was presented by Mrs Luth and consisted of a mallet. The winner was Mr E. Stowe. Twenty two locals played and the format was a knock out.

In the 1920s a "Slapdash Tournament", a Gymkhana Tournament played on Opening day, weekly tournaments, Doubles Tournaments and Annual President's Tournaments are mentioned. In the 1930s an Autumn Tournament and Monthly Tournaments are recorded. In the 1940s an Electric Light Tournament is played.

An unofficial Open Tournament was held in 1955 on the Australia Day weekend. On the Saturday Mrs Sharp from Sea Lake won the B Grade Singles (Handicap) with Mrs Harrison, Wycheproof, 2nd. Mrs Austerberry (Sea Lake) won the C Grade Singles (Handicap) with Mrs Pollard 2nd. On the Monday locals had more success with B Grade, 1st Section winner being Mrs H. Clark and 2nd Section Mrs S. Lynas. In C Grade Mrs Paterson was defeated in a play-off.

The following year (1956) the first official Open Tournament was held and was an outstanding success. Visitors came from Wycheproof, Donald, St Arnaud, Eaglehawk and locally. There were 70 entries received for the tournament which commenced on Tuesday and continued throughout the week, the final of one event being played off on Saturday. Events contested were B Grade Level Play and Handicap and also C Grade Level Play and Handicap.

Tournaments were also held in 1957, 1958 and 1959. In the 1960s club monthly Tournaments, singles and doubles, were contested.

The 1973 Tournament is remembered for the flood waters taking over. There were forty-seven entries from six different clubs. The lawns were in good order, the weather was kind and all was set for a very successful day. However, after two hours of play the flood waters took over and it seemed the tournament would be ruined, but within a short time players and goods were transported to Donald where play was soon under way on their lovely lawns.

An Association Croquet Tournament was held annually from 1973 until 2015-16 season when unfortunately, due to lack of entries, it had to be cancelled. The last Tournament was held in 2017/18.

HARNESS RACING CONTINUES TO OPERATE

In these strangest of times as we all adjust to a much simpler life, albeit at times difficult and inconvenient, our industry can be very thankful

that through good management and planning, racing continues to operate although in a much different format. In a time when all sporting organisations have come to a halt, ours continues to be broadcast world - wide and throughout Australia on a daily basis. With adversity comes opportunity and we are sure there will be many asking the question "Where is Bendigo?" (our regional track), as they watch our horses race from afar possibly for the first time. The racing industry at large is a far reaching one, and it is a testament to our administrators that they have managed to keep so many in jobs, and so many livelihoods afloat.

Whilst we have no racing at Charlton our local trainers are still racing at Bendigo, which offers two meetings a week for our region. Conditions on course are very different, with limited numbers of horses and trainers, separated by empty stalls, and all instructed to leave the course as soon as racing engagements are completed. Interaction between participants is minimised, and all requirements are monitored carefully throughout the meeting by integrity personnel, with temperature checks and social distancing measures carefully maintained.

No public, no TAB, and no food or drink facilities are operating on course.

As we are a wagering industry people's betting habits have also had to change, with no TAB outlets including pubs to put a bet on, now all bets are placed through phone accounts and wagering apps.

Whether actively racing or not, stables continue to operate – daily jobs need completing and horses still need to be fed, cared for and cleaned up after. It is paramount that horse welfare is a priority and that standards of care are adhered to as per normal.

In a nutshell – our industry remains open for business, and is a great example of all working together for each other.

HARNESS RACING MOURNS THE LOSS OF GAVIN LANG – THE BEST OF THE BEST

After a long battle with a rare type of lymphoma harness racing's most revered figure, Gavin Lang, has passed away.

Gavin was a regular visitor to Charlton and drove many horses trained and owned here over the years.

Known as Group 1 Gav for his performances in big races he drove 6303 winners in the sulky and was unrivalled for his driving ability.

Perhaps he summed up the nature of our industry best when he recently said, "I know only too well the time and effort people put in to preparing their horses. It is always special to win a race for people like that.

Harness racing is an industry, but it is also a lifestyle. There is a lot of sacrifice, but in any industry if you strive to be the best you have to be prepared to do the hard yards."

And he was the best.
